## Item 2 Education Background and Business Experience

Timothy D. Calkins was born in 1978. Mr. Calkins graduated from Canisius College with a Bachelor's degree in Finance. Mr. Calkins has been an investment adviser representative and Co-Chief Investment Officer of Nottingham Advisors, Inc. since September 2017. From July 2002 through August 2017, Mr. Calkins was a Senior Fixed Income Strategist with QCI Asset Management.

Mr. Calkins is a CFA<sup>®</sup> Charterholder. CFA<sup>®</sup> designates an international professional certificate that is offered by the CFA Institute. The Chartered Financial Analyst<sup>®</sup> (CFA<sup>®</sup>) charter is a globally respected, graduate-level investment credential established in 1962 and awarded by CFA Institute — the largest global association of investment professionals.

There are currently more than 200,000 CFA<sup>®</sup> Charterholders working in over 170 countries and regions. To earn the CFA<sup>®</sup> charter, candidates must: (1) pass three sequential, six-hour

examinations; (2) have at least four years of qualified professional investment experience; (3) join CFA Institute as members; and (4) commit to abide by, and annually reaffirm, their adherence to the CFA Institute Code of Ethics and Standards of Professional Conduct.

### **High Ethical Standards**

The CFA Institute Code of Ethics and Standards of Professional Conduct, enforced through an active professional conduct program, require CFA<sup>®</sup> Charterholders to:

- Place their clients' interests ahead of their own
- Maintain independence and objectivity
- Act with integrity

- Disclose conflicts of interest and legal matters

The Registrant's Chief Compliance Officer, Karen Washbon, is primarily responsible for the implementation of the Registrant's policies and procedures and overseeing the activities of the Registrant's supervised persons.
